LESSON OUTCOMES:


Teachers use a mentor text to illustrate the concept of growth mindset and lay the foundation for a creative exploration.

Materials

Scholars:

- Squiggle Art worksheet*
- assorted art supplies (markers, crayons, colored pencils, paint and brushes, etc.)

Teachers:

- read-aloud book: Ish by Peter Reynolds (youtube.com/watch?v=rxVSEUZiNWE)
- completed Squiggle Art worksheet (teacher's model)

Lesson Instructions: 20–30 minutes

• READ ALOUD: Invite scholars to comment as you read aloud *Ish* by Peter Reynolds. (You might do a search online for this book if you do not have it in your library.) Suggested prompts: What does it mean when the author says that "laughter haunted Ramon?" Why did Leon's laughter matter so much to Ramon? Describe Ramon's mindset when he says, "I'm done." What is the difference between Leon's and Marisol's response? What does it mean to think "ish-ly?" How did this change Ramon's energy and mindset? Does Ramon have a growth mindset at the end of the story?
