
Meet the **dots**. Dots can do a lot.




They can **freckle** a face

or **end** a thought.












Dots can be **polkas**, **dabs**, and **spots**.












They help to keep words on pages aligned.



Some lines tell us which **direction** to go.




Sometimes, lines get **lonely**, especially when they're **solo**.




Together, they make stripes and plaid designs.

or **together**, all three.




For a while it's quiet, where they all exist, close but separate, until one day a twist.




The dots and the lines, impressed by the curves, ask to play, despite their nerves.

A dot says, "Hey, I've got a thought! Starting here, **let's combine** and tie us a knot."






A curve joins the line, and **three become one.**The shape is now growing with **teamwork and fun.**

A final curve joins in, returning to the start. **Stronger**, here and now, **than standing apart.**




The **community cheers** for what they have done.

- Dots are the building blocks for everything else.
- Some artists use dots to create patterns that form images. This technique is called Pointillism.
- In art, lines are also thought of as "moving dots."
- Lines can be thick, thin, zigzag, rough, or smooth.
- Lines can move in any direction.
- Curves are another type of line.
- Curves can be open or closed.
- Sometimes artists use curves to express a sense of comfort and harmony.
- The painting photographed throughout this book is called *Kitchen Lights.* The artist used dots, lines, and curves to create abstract art inspired by something common.

Extension Activities:

Scavenger & Sketch:

 Take a walk together to hunt for interesting examples of dots, lines, and curves. Take photos as you go.
 Sketch a few of your favorite finds from photos or memory.

Conversation & Collage:

- Answer the following together: What messages does the author send in the story, Dots, Lines, & Curves - Better Together?
- Brainstorm a list of vocabulary words that go along with the themes in this book (e.g., kindness, teamwork, togetherness, play, friends, community, inclusion, respect, etc.).
- Choose one word each from the brainstorm list, and create a collage with a combination of dots, lines, and curves to spell or represent that theme. (Use the Yay! collage from the story as a visual exemplar.)

The story addresses diversity through a wide lens to invite all children to see themselves in the characters as similar, different, and better together.
